## Methodology

- Questionnaire to all London Maternity Units
- Focus group discussion with London HOM Group
- Semi structured interviews with stakeholders
- Survey to all Leads for Midwifery Education
- One in depth case study





## Findings 1

#### MSWs are:

- Relatively well established posts at Bands 2, 3 and 4
- Average current skill mix ratio 1:4
- Introduced to address workload, improve quality and patient experience
- Work across all care settings
- MSWs undertake a range of uniform tasks





## Findings 2

Inconsistency in current formal learning offers: NVQ 2/3, Foundation Degree, BTEC & NNEB and none

All trusts used NVQ3s

Mixed levels of satisfaction with current learning





### Recommendations

## Delivering the programme

- Programme delivered at LSBU central site.
- 27 students from 5 Trusts within London attend on a day release basis.
- They are supported by mentors back in their clinical areas.
- Teaching is delivered by through lectures, group work, skills based training and simulation.
- Assessments are through examinations, OSCEs, reflective writing and group and individual presentations.
