


















Spending

• 5% increase in NHS budget 2009/10 & 2010/11

•£15 - £20bn productivity savings 2009 – 2012

•Cuts to back office costs

- % Trust income linked to quality improvement
- •Best Practice Tariffs
- •Quality Accounts

Patient empowerment

- Measuring patient satisfaction
- •Legal entitlements
- •Choice of GPs





Spending

Stability

- Year-on-year increased NHS spending in real terms
- Less bureaucracy
- Decentralisation

- No more reorganisations
- Moratorium on closure of DGHs

Performance

- More power and independence for Foundation Trusts
- More competition from private & voluntary sector
- GP commissioning

• Cut DH bureaucracy by 50%




