Advancing Internationalization

- Roles of governments in advancing higher education Internationalization.

 - Higher Education Institutions are the key to driving internationalization beyond marginal growth and sustainability

Comprehensive Internationalization

Comprehensive internationalization (CIZN) is

- Commitment and action to <u>infuse</u> international, global and comparative content and perspective throughout the <u>teaching</u>, <u>research</u> and <u>service</u> missions of higher education,...
- Realizing benefits in core learning and discovery outcomes.

Sustainability

CIZN is not sustainable unless it is intimately connected to and integrated with institutional missions and modes of operation.

Seven Higher Education Trends That Will Challenge Internationalization



- 1. Funding, accountability and stature based on outcomes.
- 2. Time and cost to degree.
- 3. Growing use of Strategic Financial and Cost/Benefit Analysis.
- 4. Pressure to spread cost by through interinstitutional partnerships/collaborations.



- 5. Pressure for innovation in practices.
- 6. The pressure to build cross mission synergies.
- 7. Responding to nontraditional students who are now the "usual."
