


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


The current participation picture for 16-17 year olds





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Population - ONS projections




Past the peak




Population will keep dropping until 2018

DfE Vocational Education/Wolf Reforms - Aims

- Increase the number of students achieving high-quality and valuable vocational qualifications which enable progression to higher levels of study and skilled employment;
- Raise standards in post-16 English and mathematics so that higher numbers of students study English and mathematics (level 2) and work towards achieving GCSE A*-C in these subjects;
- Improve young people's employability skills by increasing the number of students who experience the workplace and participate in other activity of value which does not necessarily lead to qualifications but enables progression into employment.



DfE Reforms - Substance

Study Programmes – 'breadth, depth and progression into higher education, further study or skilled employment without unduly limiting the options open to them'

Funding Reform – 'funding per learner', removing perverse incentives

Minimum Standards - minimum levels of performance

Inspection – new Ofsted framework, focusing on coherence and appropriateness of students study programmes

Performance and Data Reporting – including attainment, progression, education and employment destination measures

Employer Involvement – consultation on how best to enable schools and colleges meet local and national employer needs





Main Features of Study Programmes for 16-19 year olds

- *'coherent, well thought out study programmes'* should be governed by a set of principles relating to content, structure, assessment and contact time, and:
 - not be wholly occupational
 - include at least one qualification of substantial size which offers progression into education or employment
 - include high quality work experience or internships (where appropriate) and nonqualification activity, for example tutorial time, study skills and other enrichment activities
 - include GCSE A*-C in English and/or maths or qualifications that lead towards this level, for students who have not already achieved then





16-19 Review - Case for change

Schools White Paper

• "We are also committed to all young people staying on in education and training to age 18 and a simple post-16 funding system which is fair and transparent will underpin this commitment."

Wolf Review

•Funding for full-time students age 16-18 should be on a per programme basis, with a given level of funding per student [adjusted] for differences in the content-related cost of courses, and for particular groups of high need students."

 Students without Grade C English and maths should progress towards them post 16

Purpose of funding formula review

- •To ensure the 16-19 funding formula better supports the Government's aims for transparency and fairness
- •To respond to the social mobility agenda through funding for disadvantage
- •To support the reforms recommended in the Wolf Review

Raising of the participation age

• Compulsory participation for 16 and 17 year olds by 2015.

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A clear set of principles for the new system

Supports policy objectives

- Supports full participation in education and training up to age 18 by 2015 and continued drive to close the gap between rich and poor
- Removes risks of perverse incentives to 'pile up' qualifications and steer students onto easy courses

Fair

- Funding follows the learner based on lagged funding
- Where practical, the basic elements of the formula should be aligned with proposals for a fair funding formula pre-16

Simple and transparent

- The formula should contain as few variables as possible and the main users are able to understand how budgets are calculated
- Funding is based on inputs (currently guided learning hours) which recognise the cost of delivery, not outputs

Affordable

- Delivers change without additional costs over the SR period
- The formula should allow costs to be managed no 'hidden' demand-driven elements

Avoids destabilising quality provision

 The changes should be managed carefully for example through transitional protection, to avoid destabilising quality provision



The Proposals

- Funding per Student not per qualification
- Remove Success rates but possibly include retention
- Simplified funding for disadvantage
- Simplified and reduced programme weightings
- Review Area Costs
- Detach Residential Care Standards
- Remove Short Programme modifier



Funding Formula Review: process

- Sector engagement in the development of issues for consultation
- Consultation closed January 2012
- Ministers engaged in options appraisals which have now concluded
- Expectation is for Ministers to announce their decisions very soon
- Next steps will be to:
 - Brief the sector
 - Engage with provider associations on technical implementation
 - Deliver a shadow version of the 2012-13 allocation for all providers
