- "A service hub where children under five years old and their families can receive seamless integrated services and information."
- 1997 New Labour Government
- Pledge to eradicate child poverty through Sure Start
- Phased Programme- By 2010 a Children's Centre in every Community

Cameron plans to bring 'spirit of enterprise' to Sure Start. 12/1/2010

His party would contract "self-governing" independent organisations, such as Home-Start and 4Children, which would be partly paid by results, to run children's centres. Comparing Sure Start to the academies programme he said: "We will bring a new focus, and a new spirit of enterprise and innovation to early years support."


Cameron reiterated the Conservative's commitment to increasing the number of Sure Start health visitors by 4,200, and said they would play a vital role in encouraging good parenting.

Sure Start "it isn't working as well as it should. There is little accountability in how Sure Start money is spent so the funding doesn't necessarily follow the support programmes that work."

Cameron also said it did not have enough "diversity of provision, because the voluntary sector and other community organisations have been crowded out" and that funding was confusing.

- But we believe Sure Start needs to work better because the people who need it most – disadvantaged and dysfunctional families – are not getting enough of the benefit.
- increase its focus on the neediest families, and better involve organisations with a track record in supporting families
- Provide 4,200 Health Visitors
- ensure that new Sure Start providers are paid in part by the results they achieve;
- bring all funding for early intervention and parenting support into one budget, to be overseen by a single, newly-created Early Years Support Team; and,
- set out a new approach to help families with multiple problems

Page 3 What a Children's Centre is?

"Sure Start Children's Centres improve outcomes for young children and their families and reduce inequalities, particularly for those families in greatest need of support."

"It follows from the statutory definition of a Sure Start Children's Centre that sufficiency of children's centres is as much about making appropriate and integrated services available, as it is about providing premises in particular geographical areas."

A Future For Sure Start?

According to the Daily Mail, Cameron is planning to 'stem the tide of child yobbery blighting Britain' — by giving families £100 vouchers for parenting classes. Mothers and fathers will be able to collect the free vouchers at some branches of Boots from tomorrow, entitling them to up to ten two-hour sessions on how to bring up their children. Cameron hopes the scheme will combat the breakdown in family discipline blamed for last year's riots — and that using a High Street store to distribute the vouchers will end the stigma attached to parenting lessons.

Under the £5 million scheme (called CanParent and to be launched in three test areas, Middlesbrough, Camden in North London and High Peak in Derbyshire), mothers and fathers of under-fives will each be eligible for £100 vouchers, which they can then use to buy lessons offered by independent organisations such as the National Childbirth Trust, netmums.com and Parentgym, the company run by Mr Cameron's friend and former adviser, Octavius Black (LOL DC). 13th May, 2012

A Future For Sure Start?

"The bill could soar to hundreds of millions, if, as Mr Cameron intends, it is extended rapidly throughout England and Wales and to cover children of all ages. Critics say the scheme will be an expensive and ineffective extension of the nanny state.

A Downing Street official said: 'We want parenting classes to become as normal as attending an ante-natal class, as huge numbers of couples already do. We are using Boots to hand out the vouchers because it is all part of the process of making it a normal, respectable experience. If we asked people to queue up at their local social security offices to get them, no one would be interested." **The Daily Mail, 13**th **May, 2012.**

A Future For Sure Start?

So parents can go to Boots get a free £100 Voucher to use at a Parenting Provider.

- A vibrant network of high quality children's centres, accessible to all, focused on those in greatest need
- Children's Centres working in an integrated way with other services and each other
- Professional autonomy and responsibility of children's centre leaders and staff to play a transformational role in their centre and across early years
- New ways to involve families and communities
- Strengthen accountability arrangements, to drive improvements in services particularly for families in greatest need

The unique role for Children's Centre

- Accessing need across the local community
- Providing access to universal early years services in the local area including high quality and affordable early years education and childcare
- Providing access to targeted evidence based family centred support
- Acting as a hub for the local community, building social capital and cohesion
- Sharing expertise with early years settings to improve quality

Future of Ofsted Inspections of CC's-July 2012- Liz Elsom - Ofsted September 2011-March 2012

- No of "Goods" down by 8%
- Phase 1 Centres perform markedly better than Phase 2
- Strongest aspects are Safeguarding and the quality of care, guidance and support offered to Families


Future of Ofsted Inspections of CC's-July 2012- Liz Elsom - Ofsted September 2011-March 2012

- Least positive outcomes are extent to which children are developing skills for the future and parents are developing economic stability and independence
- The effectiveness of evaluation and its use in setting ambitious targets which secure improvements in outcomes is also a weaker area

Centre leaders and Managers tell me always how busy they are.


But ask yourself:

How well you are able to <u>evidence</u> your performance will determine your OFSTED Grading and future sustainability

How can we prepare? – By fully understanding our Children's Centre and viewing it as a system so that we can successfully answer and EVIDENCE the following questions:

- What is a Children's Centre?
- Why is it needed here?
- What products/services do we provide? *Mapping Exercise*
- Who do we provide them for? Target Groups
- How do we do it? Process Map
- Are we successful? Outcomes and Impact
- Are we sustainable? Does our budget enable us to deliver the Core Purpose
- Do we learn from our mistakes so that we can improve?
 Learning & Improvement Strategy
- Can we <u>prove</u> all of the above? Portfolios of Evidence

- Lone parents, teenage parents and pregnant teenagers
- Children from low income backgrounds
- Children living with domestic abuse, adult mental health issues, and substance abuse
- Children in need or with a Child Protection
 Plan

Ofsted Inspection Schedule – April 2013. Page 41(Draft). Target groups include:

- Children of offenders and/or those in custody
- Fathers, particularly those with any identified need, for example, teenage fathers and those in custody
- Those with protected characteristics as defined by the Equality Act 2010
- Children who are in the care of the local authority (Looked after children)

Ofsted Inspection Schedule - April 2013. Page 41(Draft)

- Children who are being cared for by members of their extended family such as a grandparent, aunt or older sibling
- Families identified by the local authority as 'troubled families' who have children under five
- Families who move into and out of the area relatively quickly (transient families), such as asylum seekers, armed forces personnel and those who move into the area seeking employment or taking up seasonal work
- Any other vulnerable group or individual families including those young children and families identified at risk of harm by other services- such as adult social care, schools, police and health services

Registration Target for Target Groups?

"A large majority of families from target groups within the area the centre serves are registered with the Centre and have access to information, advice and guidance about early childhood services through the Centre, it's partners or its outreach work"

Answer- large majority- Page 45- 65-79%

Action Point- Go back to your CC and look at your current Target Group and set targets for Improvement.

Ofsted Answer: "It's for Local Authorities and Centres to define."

Action Points:

- Monitor attendance lists for your Programmes and Targeted Groups.
- On Attendance Lists create a Follow up Action Section

Suggested things for you to consider quickly at your Centre and Local Authority:

- What data do you ask for upon pre Registration and Registration? Who completes Registration/Membership Forms?
- How accurate is the current Database for all Members and Target Groups?
- How timely do we receive information on our Members/Target Groups?
- Do we need to amend our Attendance sheets?
- Can we show our Attendance based upon SOA and Target Group?

"The area in which there is the greatest deprivation sees the highest level of engagement with the Centre at 81%." OUTSTANDING. Westgate and Newburgh. July 2012

"Participation rates and attendance levels are very high. For example the programme for teenage parents has over 90% attendance." OUTSTANDING. Grange Park and Leyton. Blackpool. January 2012

"Recent data shows that only 9% of children of minority ethnic origins and 1% of children from workless households accessed services in the first quarter." INADEQUATE. Wycombe East. September 2011.

The future for Target Groups

Suggested things for you to consider at your Centre and Local Authority:

- Map the current information systems you have to collect the relevant data;
- What are the gaps?
- Identify where the 'quick wins' are?
- Develop Systems to close the gaps

Systems may include:

- Information Sharing and Referral protocol with Partner Agencies e.g
 Health; GP's; Housing Associations; Faith Groups
- Change in the format of the Registration/Membership Form
- Joint Future staff meetings with CC and Social Care

How did CC's become outstanding?

Lesson 1

Maximise registrations and participations across the Reach area and across your target groups. Set challenging, ambitious year on year targets for improvements in these.

Lesson 2

Ensure that self evaluation is at the heart of your CC and is evidence based and includes the setting of ambitious and challenging targets for your performance.

Lesson 3

Know your community and Reach Area. Establish systems that continually update you on how your area is changing.

Lesson 4 – Equality and Diversity

Centres ensure that what they do and whom they do it with reflects the diversity of their communities, and they give considered thought to how and where they provide services and the resoucces used.

Lesson 5

Have effective and challenging Governance for Advisory Boards and for Parents Forums.

Lesson 6

Have evidence that services are now delivered by former services users- "A grow your own approach."
